As a person who went through a devastating revolution in her country three years ago. I was seeing the world differently before coming here, to the new world. I was thinking of the other countries from an angle entirely based on the news. I was seeing South Korea as one of a whole country which divided as a result of a conflict, Japan as a country where one of the worst nuclear bomb destroyed two of its cities, the US as a country where outstanding civil rights movements occurred in calling for freedom. But after coming here and engaging with international people either students or teachers, I took another way of thinking that because of this history, these countries took their shapes now and gave birth to generations that pursue improvement and success.

We might have a concord about that the world is different from one place to another, but we do not feel it until we have a friction with people from different walks of life. I cannot tell what was my feeling in the first days in the US. At first, I felt some constraint with the diversity of people. My feeling was Like tentative feeling of a baby, who is unaccustomed to a strangers, about approaching the new babysitter. In my home country, especially in my city, we are not used to see or deal with foreign people like Chinese, Japanese, or American, so I seldom, if ever, striven to make friendship with foreign people even through the Internet. Moreover, I didn't imagine that my life would look different if I interacted with people from different cultural backgrounds. I was like someone who wrongly thought that he had a vestigial organ, appendix like, but this organ was really working without noticing it. My new experience showed me the significance of that organ and started to perpetuate a bright, different image of the surrounding world.

The ELTI was the key that opened the door of my experience with international students. It represented many divergent cultures in a homogenous mixture. To sum it up in one pithy sentence : "The international experience curtailed the world's image in my mind".

In succinct words, I want to conclude by saying that Every country has its own flavor that cannot be tasted in the other countries. Therefore, the people of these countries represent that flavor by their cultural differences and that is the attracting diversity that I am talking about, the core of innovation and creation.
